Jesus Raises a Dead Girl and Heals a Sick Woman

- While he spake these things unto them, behold, there came a certain ruler, and worshipped him, saying, My daughter is even now dead: but come and lay thy hand upon her, and she shall live.

- 1. While he spake these things unto them. While he talked about fasting at Matthew's table.
- 2. There came a ruler, and worshipped him. See Mark 5:22.
- 3. Saying, My daughter is even now dead. See Mark 5:23.
- **9:19** And Jesus arose¹, and followed him, and [so did] his disciples.
 - 1. And Jesus arose. From Matthew's table. Jesus did not fast for form's sake, but he was ever ready to leave a feast that he mightconfer a favor.
- 9:22 But Jesus turning and seeing her said, **Daughter**, be of good cheer¹; thy faith hath made thee whole². And the woman was made whole from that hour.
 - 1. Daughter, be of good cheer. Faith gets a sweet welcome.

HEALING BLIND MEN AND A DUMB DEMONIAC. (Probably Capernaum.) Matthew 9:27-34

- 1. And as Jesus passed by from thence. If construed strictly, this phrase means, as he departed from Jairus' house. But the phrase isindefinite.
- 2. Son of David. This, among the Jews, was a common and thoroughly recognized name for the expected Messiah.

9:28 And when he was come into the house¹, the blind men came to him: and Jesus saith unto them, Believe ye that I am able to do this²? They say unto him, Yea, Lord.

- 1. When he was come into the house. Possibly Peter's. But the place is not important. The house is mentioned to show that the blind menpersistently followed Jesus until he stopped.
- 2. Believe ye that I am able to do this? In the earlier stages of his ministry Jesus had worked his miracles with little or no solicitation; but now, as the evidences of his power were multiplied, Jesus demanded fuller expression of faith; for faith was the fruitage for which themiracles were wrought.

9:30 And their eyes were opened. And **Jesus strictly charged them**¹, saying, See that no man know it.

- 9:31 But they went forth, and spread abroad his fame in all that land.

1. But they went forth, and spread abroad his fame in all that land. Jesus might well speak severely when charging his beneficiaries to besilent (Matthew 9:30), for apparently no one of them ever obeyed him.

Matthew 9:18-26. THE WOMAN WITH THE ISSUE OF BLOOD HEALED.-THE DAUGHTER OF JAIRUS RAISED TO LIFE. (= <u>Luke 8:40-56</u>, <u>5:21-43</u>).

These two miracles are recorded by Matthew alone.

Two Blind Men Healed (Matthew 9:27-31).

- 27. And when Jesus departed thence, two blind men followed him--hearing, doubtless, as in a later case is expressed, "that Jesus passed by" (Matthew 20:30). crying, and saying, Thou son of David, have mercy on us--It is remarkable that in the only other recorded case in which the blind applied to Jesus for their sight, and obtained it, they addressed Him, over and over again, by this one Messianic title, so well known--"Son of David" (Matthew 20:30). Can there be a doubt that their faith fastened on such great Messianic promises as this, "Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened," &c. (Isaiah 35:5).9 and if so, this appeal to Him, as the Consolation of Israel, to do His predicted office, would fall with great weight upon the ears of Jesus.
- 28. And when he was come into the house--To try their faith and patience, He seems to have made them no answer. But the blind men came to Him--which, no doubt, was what He desired. and Jesus saith unto them, Believe ye that I am able to do this? they said unto him, Yea, Lord--Doubtless our Lord's design was not only to put their faith to the test by this question, but to deepen it, to raise their expectation of a cure, and so prepare them to receive it; and the cordial acknowledgment, so touchingly simple, which they immediately made to Him of His power to heal them, shows how entirely that object was gained.
- 29. Then touched he their eyes, saying, According to your faith be it unto you--not, Receive a cure proportioned to your faith, but, Receive this cure as granted to your faith. Thus would they carry about with them, in their restored vision, a gracious seal of the faith which drew it from their compassionate Lord.
- 30. And their eyes were opened: and Jesus straitly charged them--The expression is very strong, denoting great earnestness.
